Lent: A Spiritual and Artistic Journey to the Cross

As I prepared for our Lenten journey, I kept being drawn to the writer Henri Nouwen and his claim that we are all wounded healers. We all have our wounds and as people of faith, we can let these wounds pull us away from the community or let God use our wounds as a way to find healing and wholeness for us and for others.

“If we listen to the voice and believe that ministry is a sign of hope, because it makes visible the first sign of light of the coming Messiah, we can make ourselves and others understand that we already carry in us the source of our own search. Thus ministry can indeed be a witness to the living truth that the wound, which causes us to suffer now, will be revealed to us later as the place where God intimated the new creation.” (Henri Nouwen, *The Wounded Healer*)

As Nouwen moved through his ministry, he was fascinated by Van Gogh’s art and how Van Gogh, through his paintings and letters to his brother, Theo, came to embody this idea of a “wounded healer”. In fact, Van Gogh was a minister for part of his career, following in his father’s footsteps, loving to serve the least of these and sharing the message about God’s amazing love. What fascinated Nouwen was the fact that throughout Van Gogh’s ministry and his life, Van Gogh was fascinated by finding the sacred in the ordinary events of life and as he strived to share these experiences with everyone. And as he continued on his journey and as he struggled with faith, struggled with the church, and struggled with personal demons, he painted; painted pictures of peasants breaking bread, painted the stars at night, and painted portraits of “wounded healers”: ordinary people whose life and work had wounded them emotionally and physically but who still celebrated LIFE and HOPE, two key elements to the Gospel message.

And that is what I invite us to do as Midway Christian Church, to find the sacred in the ordinary events of our lives and allow God to use our wounds as signs of hope and healing, just as God did with the cross. The cross was just ordinary wood fashioned to form an instrument of suffering and to inflict wounds. God took what was ugly, scarred and turned it into something beautiful, turned it into a sign of hope and used the wounds that it inflicted to reflect healing and new life.

So each week along our Lenten journey, we will use paintings by Van Gogh and words by Henri Nouwen to meet God in the ordinary sacred moments and to embrace our wounds and their wounds to bring healing and hope to a world that is crying out for Good News.

February Mission Payments

Midway College: Midway College, formerly the Kentucky Female Orphan School, was the dream of Dr. Lewis Letig Pinkerton, a young physician and minister of the Christian Church (Disciples of Christ). Together with James Ware Parrish, the Midway Christian Church elder who raised the funds necessary to open the school, they joined with other progressive thinkers to launch a revolutionary educational experiment.

The few girls who received formal education were taught to read only because it was considered necessary for their role as mothers. When they reached adulthood, they would read the Bible to their children.

The college's affiliation with the Christian Church (Disciples of Christ) remains strong and many members of the student body are active members of Christian Church congregations.

Week of Compassion Special Offering

We live in a world of strangers and it is our responsibility, as God's children, to "welcome" them; to show them hospitality, care, and concern. Matthew 25: 38-40 asks, "When was it that we saw you a stranger and welcomed you, or naked and gave you clothing? And when was it we saw you sick and visited you?" Christmas Food Boxes

Under the name of Midway Ministerial Association, we served 35 households, both families and individuals, in either Midway or the Midway school district. The district includes families living on the north side of Versailles. Those in or near Versailles, included in the names provided by, were families with children at Northside Elementary School and not otherwise being served. Our donations also come in part from outside Midway. Of cash purchases of fresh meats, fruits and potatoes (\$906.41), 62 % were paid for with donations and 38% paid for with Midway Lions Club funds. Of the 6 cases of peanut butter donated by the Smuckers Plant (Jiff) in Lexington, 1/2 were immediately passed on to the Midway Food Pantry at the Midway Baptist Church in response to an urgent request. The Midway Food Pantry later received 1400 pounds of food immediately before Christmas from God's Pantry. 4 to 6 boxes of mostly canned goods previously designated to families that we could no longer locate, are being held for delivery to the Midway Food Pantry when they again have the storage space. Cash donations for the Christmas Food boxes were down several hundred dollars from annual donations directly to the Midway Lions Club for 2008 and 2007. ~ Dan Roller
